Graduation Requirements

What do you need to graduate from high school?

18 compulsory credits

Students must earn the following compulsory credits to obtain the Ontario Secondary School Diploma:

Plus one credit from each of the following groups:

- 4 credits in English (1 credit per grade)*
- 3 credits in mathematics (1 credit in Grade 11 or 12)
- 2 credits in science
- 1 credit in Canadian history
- 1 credit in Canadian geography
- 1 credit in the arts
- 1 credit in health and physical education
- 1 credit in French as a second language
- 0.5 credit in career studies
- 0.5 credit in civics

In addition, students must complete:

- √ 12 optional credits¹
- / 40 hours of community involvement activities
- the provincial literacy requirement

- ** In groups 1, 2 and 3, a maximum of 2 credits in French as a second language can count as compulsory credits, one from group 1 and one from either group 2 or group 3.
- *** A maximum of 2 credits in cooperative education can count as compulsory credits.
- [†] The 12 optional credits may include up to 4 credits earned through approved dual credit courses.

Community Service Hours

- •40 Hours minimum commencing the summer after Grade 8
- Approved by the SCDSB Guidelines
- •Must be recorded and submitted on the appropriate form with signatures to the Main Office

Supports within the school

- Guidance Counsellors: career and credit counselling guidance towards postsecondary and career options
- Student Success: to support students with assignment and credit recovery, helping them get on track with their classes. Also, a quiet safe space for students to work
- Resource Teachers: support students with IEPs and help them to be successful in their classes through all aspects: organization, assignments, time management
- Mental Health Support Team: a team of social workers, clinicians, child and youth workers assist our students with personal issues that impede on their academic and social well being.
- Attendance Counsellors: attendance issues are monitored by a team of counsellors who work with parents, teachers, students to re-engage students back to school for optimum success
- Chaplain: responsible for supporting the spiritual, social, and emotional well being of the student community
- Indigenous Support Worker: Our Indigenous Support Worker provides cultural support in order to foster an inclusive learning environment. Cultural awareness activities are routinely embedded for staff and students.


